

In their own words.

'There to meet with Macbeth'

This is probably the most important Witches quote. We never know why they target Macbeth, but it is clearly stated in the first scene that they are planning to meet him after the battle.

'Foul is fair and foul is fair'

Not only do the witches see everything as inverse to normal, but this quote tells us they corrupt - they take what is fair and make it foul - and they will do so to Macbeth.

'All hail, Macbeth, thou shalt be king hereafter!'

Of the three prophesies - the first two are statements of fact, this is the only one that predicts the future.

By the pricking of my thumbs,

Something wicked this way comes."

By the time Macbeth comes to find them in the 4th act his has been altered hugely. He is recognised as wicked by the witches - evil recognises evil!

What do others say?

'So foul and fair a day I have not seen'

Macbeth's first line - its telling he echoes the words of the witches. You can interpret it in a number of ways, but it certainly foreshadows the effect they will have on him.

The 'weird sisters'

Macbeth never calls them witches - they are the 'weird sisters'. This comes from the Anglo-Saxon 'wyrd' meaning 'controlling human destiny'.

'instruments of darkness' 'what, can the devil speak true?'

Despite Banquo's enthusiasm to talk to them in the first act, it is tempered by his comments to Macbeth after his prophecies. He clearly knows they are evil and tries to warn Macbeth.
